Friday, November 30, 2018: The Cuban Papers: An Overview to Researching this Treasure of Spanish Colonial Documents from the 16th, 17th and early 18th century presented by Mary "Anthony" Startz

We meet at the University Baptist Church (UBC) in the Chapel on the 1st floor (16106 Middlebrook Drive, Houston, TX 77059 - online map).

If your ancestor was an early English Loyalist or American immigrant into the Spanish Colonies between 1761 and 1821 in the areas of Florida to the Mississippi Valley to Louisiana, you will want to look for them in a resource called the The Papeles Procedentes de la Isla de Cuba, more commonly known as the Cuban Papers. The collection is on 1,000 rolls of microfilm and is in the Clayton Library Center for Genealogical Research. In this presentation, Startz will review the resource guides available to drill into these reels of microfilm and the variety of documents contained in this collection.

more than thirty years. 

October Program Recap

Thank you Gay Carter for encouraging us to start following blogs, podcasts, and participating in online training. Her handout includes a wonderful list of articles containing "the best of" podcasts, YouTube videos, and blogs. All three are online communication tools that can be accessed by the public. A blog is a chronological set of published (visual reading) articles by one person or company. A podcast is a

chronological set of published (audio listening) programs by one person or company. Generally, published entries in a blog and podcast are focused on a specific topic theme, presented in a conversational style, and the public may respond by posting comments. You can access Gay's handout and her recommendations on the BAGS website (www.TxBayAreaGen.org). Click on Members Page, enter password, click on Archived Meeting Handouts and then on the link 2018-10-26 to view the handout.

Gay also discussed the free online training provided by FamilySearch via their Learning Center. This is a perfect resource for individuals just beginning or stumped with their research. Access the Learning Center directly at https://www.familysearch.org/ask/landing?search=Getting%20Started&show=lessons then search for a specific ethnicity, country, state, time period, record type, or event. There are even courses on reading a specific language. Access an individual course at any time. No registration is required. The course consists of one or more online videos you watch within the web browser, no additional software required. A matching handout will be available for download/print. There are a number of courses covering research and records for countries worldwide (e.g. search for a specific country) and explaining resources available for researching ancestor life events (e.g. search for a specific event such as military, religion, vital, migration, land). Few course examples are:
