

#### Genealogy Online: MyHeritage.com Saturday, October 5 from 10:30am to 11:45am

Join us for an introduction to one of our newest genealogy e-resources: *MyHeritage Library Edition*. Accessible both at home and in-library, it contains over 6 billion historical records, including census, military, newspapers, vital records, directories, family trees, and more. In addition to North America, *MyHeritage* has one of the most comprehensive sets of European genealogical records of any commercial database, as well as millions of records from around the world.

#### Secrets in the Genes Saturday, October 12 from 10:30am to 11:30am

Using case studies, Clayton Library staff member Rodney Sam illustrates how using DNA evidence and traditional genealogical research can confirm oral histories and unknown parentage with little to no paper trail.

### 10:00am – *Technology Enabled Collaborations for Genealogists* presented by Tony Hanson, Family Historian broadcasted from the Dallas Public Library

This presentation will examine three relatively new capabilities that are enabling collaborative family research: The Family Search Family Tree, Ancestry.com's ThruLines DNA tool, and self-publishing family history using a blog or a website. Attendees will learn the benefits provided by each and will learn how to effectively incorporate them into their own personal research methodology.

### 11:00am – Finding Elusive Records on FamilySearch.org presented by John Huff, FamilySearch Experience Manager broadcasted from Salt Lake City, UT

Learn the search skills and features of FamilySearch.org to take you to a new level of access of this 2 billion image database. This tutorial will take you step-by-step through the process of how to utilize the FamilySearch catalog, unindexed image collections and more.

### 12:00pm – Genealogy Basics: Getting Started on Your Family Tree presented by Carl Smith, Genealogy Librarian, Montgomery County Memorial Library System broadcasted from Central Library, Conroe

Budding researchers will learn the basics they need to get started researching their family tree. We'll cover the first steps to take to begin your research, starting with home sources. We'll also cover the types of records that are useful for genealogical research and where they can be found. We'll also cover ways to stay organized by utilizing paper charts and forms or computer software.

### 1:40pm – *Probate: More Than a Will* presented by Kelvin Meyers, Ancestry ProGenealogists Researcher, broadcasted from the Downtown Arlington Public Library

Most persons in America, who lived to adulthood, left some type of an estate to be administered. Some left wills, some did not; either way if there was land or large amounts of personal property, their estate had to be disposed of. The records of probate can be some of the most fruitful for the genealogist.

## 2:50pm – Roll Call: New Sites and Sources for Military Records and Research presented by Curt B. Witcher, MLS, FUGA, IGSF Manager, The Genealogy Center Senior Manager, Special Collections, Allen County Public Library broadcasted from Fort Wayne, IN

This presentation explores the growing number of consequential websites for the researcher interested in military history and military ancestors. From bibliographic databases to sites that provide copies of first-hand accounts and images of actual records, this talk provides one with key sites and strategies for locating increasing amounts of meaningful military data on the Internet.

### 4:00pm – *Introduction to GEDmatch* presented by Sara Allen, Librarian, Genealogy Center, Allen County Public Library broadcasted from Fort Wayne, IN

Once you have taken a DNA test, you may be urged to upload your results to GEDmatch. What is GEDmatch and why should you use it? GEDmatch is a free third party website that you can use to compare your DNA results with people who have taken the autosomal DNA test from all the major testing companies. You can also use a variety of tools and utilities (some free, and some subscription only) that help analyze your DNA results. Learn more about GEDmatch at this session.

### 6:15pm – *Finding Your Ancestors in Mexico* presented by Esther Camacho, South Texas Librarian, Genealogist, and Historical Researcher broadcasted from Edinburg, TX

This program will demonstrate the types of records used to trace ancestors from the United States into Mexico. There is a breadth of information available for researchers including census, border crossing records, immigration, civil records, and church records.

## 7:25pm - Dating Family Photos by Photo Process, Apparel, Hair Styles and More presented by David Coleman, Director, The Wittliff Collections, Texas State University broadcasted from San Marcos, TX

Do you possess photos that you wish you could at least date? Learn what to evaluate and the resources available to help you. Follow David's process as he takes us through samples and learn how to apply his technique to your own photos.

#### 9:05am (central) Session 1: Exploring History Hub for Genealogist and Researchers

Hit a snag in your research? Bring your question to History Hub, the National Archives' pioneering online platform for crowdsourced historical and genealogical research, where Archives staff and expert community members alike are waiting to lend their expertise. Learn about the capabilities of History Hub including how to search from the pool of existing questions, how to post your own question, how to sign up and join the community, see what our partner agencies are doing, and more.

#### 10am (central) Session 2: Preserving Personal Collections

This sessions will provide tips and information on the care and storage of paper, books, photographs, as well as film, audio, and video. Providing the best environment and storage will allow family heirlooms to be available for generations, while understanding proper handling and copying can expand their availability and enjoyment with distant kin.

11am (central) Session 3: Immigrant Records: More Than Just Ship Passenger Arrival This session will identify what original records you can find at the National Archives and what you can discover online. Records discussed will range from passport applications, naturalization documents, passenger arrival lists, and more! Attendees will discover how immigration laws have changed over time and how the records that exist have been impacted by those laws; understand the different types of records available through the National Archives; and learn how to get started with research.

## 12pm (central) Session 4: Using National Archives Records to Research World War I Naval and Marine Corps Records for Genealogical Research

In this session, archivist Nathaniel Patch offers a guide to discovering the story of your World War I Sailor and Marine using the Records of the National Archives. Although for the experienced to advanced researcher, beginners will learn where to access easily understood records (such as deck logs, war diaries, and unit records), and how to build on that information to find more material in complicated record series.

## 1pm (central) Session 5: Discovering and Researching Bureau of Indian Affairs School Records

Federally run schools for American Indian children first emerged in the mid 19th century and became a potent tool of cultural assimilation for decades, This presentation will discuss the records of Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) boarding and day schools, looking at both individual student case files as well as general administrative records, what was and was not saved, what can be found within them, and what privacy restrictions exist. These records not only chronicle a student's academic career but often health, family, and life after school. General school records paint a portrait of school life and can further flesh out an individuals history at a particular school at a particular time.

#### 2pm (central) Session 6: The Homestead Act: Land Records of Your Ancestors

James Muhn explains the basic provisions of the Homestead Act and demonstrates how to research and interpret homestead documents found in Record Group 49, Records of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) for family history research. Learn about how relevant records such as tract books, public land entry case files, patents and other associated documents can be found and the information they can tell you.
