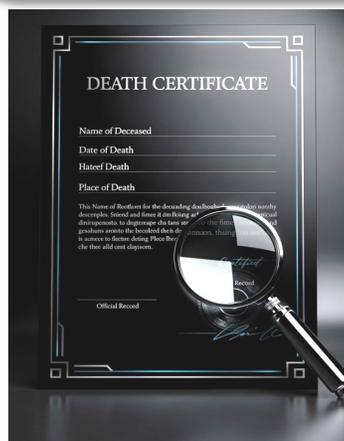

From Dust to Data: How ILCD and ICD Codes Can Guide Genealogical Journeys

The language of death records can feel like a foreign dialect to today's genealogist. Words such as "dropsy," "consumption," or "brain fever" may appear on a death certificate or cemetery register, leaving us unsure what they truly mean—or how to use them in our research.

That's where the **International List of Causes of Death (ILCD)** and the later **International Classification of Diseases (ICD)** become powerful tools for family historians.

Developed to standardize how causes of death were recorded across time and place, these coding systems can help genealogists translate confusing historical terminology into modern understanding. More importantly, they allow us to move beyond vague descriptions and uncover deeper context about the health, hardships, and lived experiences of our ancestors.

In this session, you'll discover how ILCD and ICD codes can serve as a bridge—from dusty old documents to meaningful data that strengthens your genealogical conclusions.

How to Craft an AI Prompt

~ Written with the assistance of Perplexity AI

Artificial intelligence (AI) is becoming more common in everyday life, and you might wonder how genealogists can use these tools. You may have seen tools like ChatGPT, Perplexity, Gemini, or Claude mentioned online and wondered if they could help with your genealogy. The short answer is yes – but only if you use them carefully and understand what they *can't* do.

Why You Can't Ask AI to "Research Your Family"

It is tempting to type something like, "Find everything you can about my great-grandmother Nellie Tuttle from NYC," and expect AI to go off and search records for you. That is *not* how these tools work. They do not log in to Ancestry, FamilySearch, MyHeritage, or any other database, nor do they check original documents or images. Instead, they generate answers by predicting what words "fit together" based on patterns in the information they were trained on. When they don't really know, they often *guess* – but they still sound very sure of themselves. For genealogy, that might mean:

- Invented birth or death dates
- Wrong relationships between people
- Made-up sources, books, or record sets

You should never treat AI responses as proof. Use them as ideas to explore, not as facts to copy into your tree.

Last year, I asked AI to help me find a marriage announcement for my grandparents. They were married in 1933 in New York City. I gave it all the details, and it gave me so many places to look! Most of them were made-up sources and none led to a marriage announcement. You must craft your prompt carefully, so you don't waste your own time.

What AI Is Good For

Even though AI can't "do your research," it can still be a very helpful assistant. Think of it more like a brainstorming partner than a record-searching engine. It can:

- Suggest record types you might have overlooked
- Help you draft or rewrite short stories about your ancestors
- Turn rough notes into a clearer summary or outline
- Explain background history for a time or place
- Transcribe records

Used this way, AI can save time and make writing and planning easier while you remain in charge of the actual research. Steve Little created a 5-part prompt, demonstrated below:

Tips for Writing Prompts

Give a ROLE: You need an expert. What job do they have?

Give AI a GOAL: Tell it exactly what you want.

Give AI the TEXT: Provide AI with the background information or article you want transcribed.

Give AI the TASK: Break down the task you want it to perform into subtasks.

Give AI the FLASK: Tell AI how its answer should look.

Example:

ROLE: *You are an expert genealogist.*

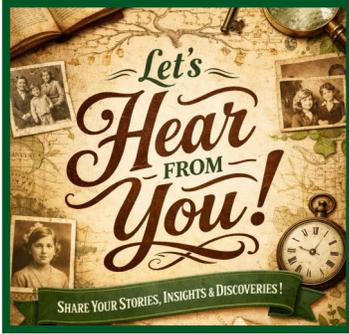
GOAL: *Transcribe the handwritten document exactly.*

TEXT: *Upload the document.*

TASK: *Preserve original spelling, punctuation, and line breaks. Use [brackets] for unclear words and ? for illegible words.*

FLASK: *Number the lines.*

Staying Safe and Accurate

Because AI can hallucinate – make up realistic-sounding but false information – you always need to doublecheck.

- Verify every fact in real records or trusted databases.
- Do not paste full details about living people; protect their privacy.
- Treat AI results like you would treat an online family tree created by someone else: useful clues, but never proof on their own.

If you keep these limits in mind, AI can be a helpful tool in your genealogy toolbox without leading you astray.

An example PROMPT I used: You are an expert genealogist. Transcribe this handwritten document exactly as written, preserving original spelling, punctuation, and line breaks. Use [brackets] for unclear words and ? for illegible words. This is a deed from Dale County, Alabama in 1869. 300 acres were sold by Susan B Lawrence to Benedict Craft.
